3 Collaborative interdisciplinary student projects

Many programmes are geared towards turning out specialists who will go on to fulfil a role within a multidisciplinary team or organisation. However, students have very few opportunities to interact with specialists from other areas. Technological convergence means that designed artefacts often require a combination of specialised elements, but by definition specialists are not in a position to deliver all of them. Could interdisciplinary collaborations at Honours level help to overcome these limitations of our current programme structures? If a software engineer could collaborate with a product designer would the result be greater than the sum of the parts? If a musician could collaborate with a games developer would the insights they gain add value to the final year project experience? In work supported by the Teaching Fellows Grant Fund, Ian Lambert and Brian Davison are exploring the feasibility of collaborative interdisciplinary major projects. Please come to the stall and give your opinions about the potential benefits, quality hurdles, subject-specific opportunities, management challenges, etc. Think it could never work? Best idea since pencils? Just interested? Don't keep your ideas to yourself – we want to know.

4 ENCompass and Digital Literacy

The Library is preparing a collection of services and resources to help students and staff consider their understanding and engage with digital literacy. ENCompass is our Moodle-based Digital Literacy space which guides students through digital identities and footsteps, discovering and effectively using online information, and the benefits to sharing and collaborating online. This stall will demo ENCompass and talk about plans to take Digital Literacy forward from September 2014.

5 New technologies from Information Services

This stall will demonstrate a range of newly available technology services for supporting learning, teaching and assessment.

Camtasia Relay makes it simple to record and publish your presentations to the online video server (aka Helix Media Library). Camtasia Relay can easily be installed on your office or home computers for private recordings, and on mobile devices to enable a wide range of video recording possibilities.

The Moodle-Helix integration allows you to manage access to online videos within your Moodle courses, and provides a secure method for students to submit video assignments and receive video (or audio) feedback within the Moodle Gradebook.

Mahara ePortfolios provide private and group spaces for students and staff to record achievements and share artefacts as evidence in support of professional development planning (PDP). The Moodle integration allows Mahara pages to be submitted to Moodle for formal grading, and to export Moodle content into Mahara.

Feedback in GradeMark is no longer limited to written coursework. Turnitin now accepts submissions from any file type (for example, image and video files), and so GradeMark can be used to provide feedback on a wide range of activities. In fact students do not need to submit anything at all to Turnitin, and by using the offline grading feature of Turnitin for iPads, assessed activities can be graded in locations without an internet connection.

The Virtual Desktop provides a standard Windows 7 desktop for all staff and students from most mobile devices anywhere with an internet connection. This service provides access to your private H drive and shared S drive, most University network applications, and the Outlook email client (staff only).

Novi is the University's new online survey tool, which supports the needs of the University Ethics Committee, and is more secure and reliable than other 'free' utilities available on the Internet.

6 Assessment App

This stand will showcase a prototype for an Assessment App which halves marking time! A new system with constructive alignment at its heart brings ease of use for the marker and clarity of feedback to the student. Come along and see how!

7 Distributed Online Supervision System for Dissertation Projects

A new prototype of an online supervision system that is designed to centralise all the supervision workflow will be demonstrated at this stall. The new approach hopes to ease the supervision process between all parties involved (student, supervisors, module leader, administrative coordinator, and examiners), provide an effective tool of communication, monitoring and quality control, and promote the use of technology in teaching and learning in the higher education.

8 The Mobile Learning Journal

As part of the learning activities in a module students are required to maintain a reflective learning journal during the module. While in the past this learning journal has normally taken the form of a bound A5 plain paper note book this year has seen students utilising mobile devices and tablets which they carry with them to record their thoughts and learning activities. One such student demonstrated his use of the tablet and app to me during his 'short term plan' interview with me. This is your chance to see his learning journal app.

11 Moodle flashcard generation: an application for reference guidance

Edinburgh Napier used to provide referencing guidance through PDF format but the student population felt this did not promote active learning. A student group in consultation with staff believed this could be improved and simplified for the School of Nursing, Midwifery & Social Care, improving the student experience and promoting active learning. One of the solutions that the partnership raised was a mobile application based on a flashcard action. Information Services was approached to develop a mobile application, which could be embedded in the University site. In addition, the app could be developed as a general University flashcard application that staff could populate with content, as the course, module and/or student need requires in terms of promoting active learning.

There is a lot of mystery and anxiety surrounding the thought that one day, you might be the only rescuer available in a medical emergency such as this. How might you perform? What would you do? Modern day technology is such that critically important intervention could literally be in your hands in the form of an AED (Automated External Defibrillator). Do you realise that you might have to use the AED that's sitting at your campus reception? Being able to do that raises the casualty's chance of survival – so visit us to develop some hands-on CPR skills and operate the AED. Remember – you might be the only chance of life that a person has when the cardiac arrest situation arises. A life skill like this one might change everything.
