

Keeping up to date with research: SACI

There are a number of easy ways to keep up to date with research. Rather than visit each of the major journals in your subject area, you can get the latest research to come to you.

Generally, the advice is to pick up eresource links from LibrarySearch <http://librarysearch.napier.ac.uk> Today, however, you will be asked to use the links provided or to Google. This is because there are some computing lab login issues.

Today, you can choose to set up one or more of the following:

- **Journal new issue alerts** – you will receive the table of contents
- **Search alerts** – these are set up across multiple journals on a particular database/publisher site.
- **RSS feeds** – these deliver tables of contents or new search results to your desktop (or a web-based feed reader).
- **Tables of contents services** – you can sign up in one location to get tables of contents from multiple journals.
- **LibrarySearch** – you can set up search alerts or RSS feeds to receive links to new records retrieved by your saved search.

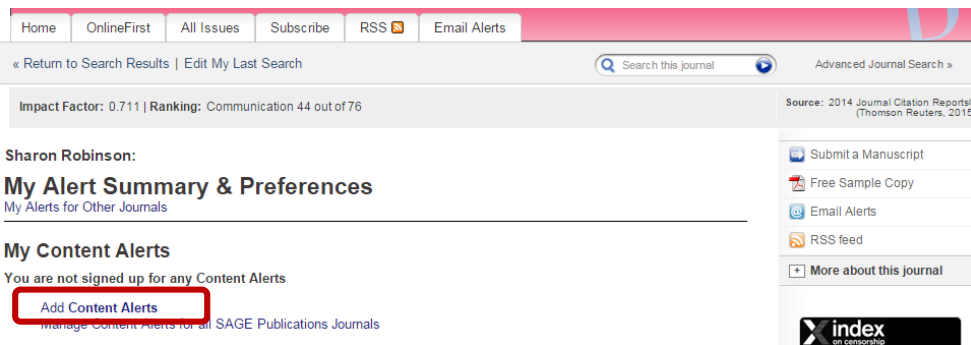
New journal issue alerts

To set up a journal alert, you first need to create a personal account. Often you will need to validate a link sent to your email account before you can set up your alert. You can organise your email alerts by creating folders <https://support.office.com/en-us/article/Manage-email-messages-by-using-rules-c24f5dea-9465-4df4-ad17-a50704d66c59>

1. Google **Sage Discourse Communication** <http://dcm.sagepub.com/>
2. Click **Sign In** > sign in or sign up (if you don't already have an account).
3. Return to the journal home page > **Email Alerts**

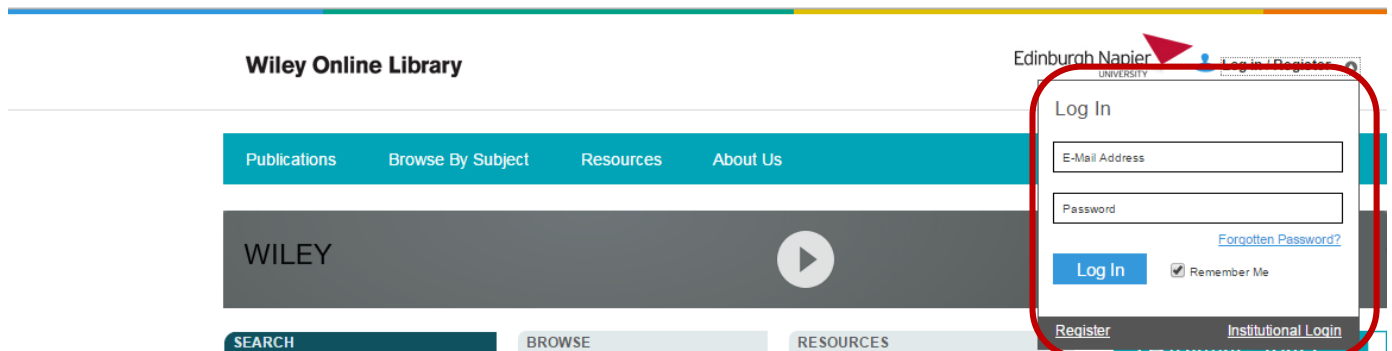

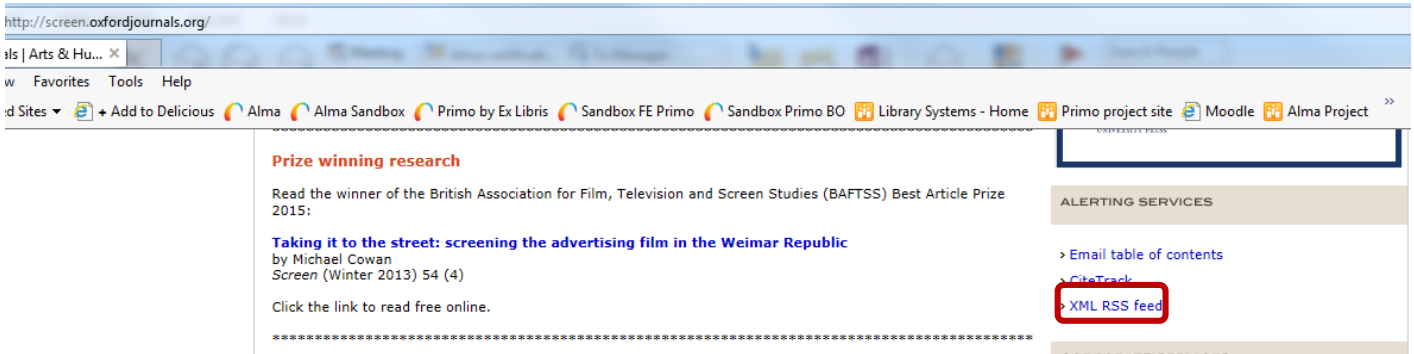
Managing Alerts

Alerts are e-mail notifications when new content is available for a specific publication or when new results are available for a search you've saved. Using the Alert Manager, you can view all of your alerts, change your preferences and also pause your alerts. Go to the Alert Manager

RSS feeds

RSS feeds require a “reader”. Internet Explorer has an inbuilt one. However, readers need to be added to Chrome and Firefox, and to all but the latest versions of OS X. Users of Windows 10 are advised to use Chrome or Firefox because Edge does not accommodate RSS feeds. More details can be found on the staff intranet [library pages](#)

2. Click on **XML RSS feed**.



3. Select **RSS** option.

RSS information page

What are RSS feeds?

RSS stands for "RDF Site Summary" or "Really Simple Syndication". It provides a mechanism to subscribe to "headlines" from a web site. RSS can be used as an alternative to electronic tables of contents for receipt of up-to-date TOC and Abstract information, or as a way of syndicating information from this website on another site.

What information is available via RSS?

The RSS feeds provide TOC and Abstract information for recent and current issues of each journal. Two feeds are available for this journal:

- RSS** Screen - RSS feed of current issue
- RSS** Screen - RSS feed of recent issues (covers the latest 3 issues, including the current issue)
- RSS** Advance Access - RSS feed of articles published online ahead of print
- RSS** Most Frequently Read Articles
- RSS** Most Frequently Cited Articles

4. **Subscribe to this feed.**

Contested territory: American film spectatorship, colonial mimicry and British Empire

This essay examines an account of cinema spectatorship in 1920s Jamaica as relayed by a British librarian's treatise advocating for the extended use of film in education. He details how African Jamaican women attended mission churches dressed in the flapper style, mimicking the American movie stars they had seen at the local cinema. Like similar stories of 'primitive' spectatorship, this account of movie mimicry is meant to function as evidence of the relatively new medium's unprecedented powers of persuasion over colonial subjects, children, women, and other individuals characterized as feeble-minded. As such, it seems to confirm the imperial fantasy of the superiority of the colonizing culture. But as I demonstrate, this instance of colonial mimicry also triggered anxieties about American cultural hegemony in the British Empire because the Jamaican women chose to mimic the American movie stars they saw on screen rather than the other, competing models of white femininity they were exposed to at the mission. I therefore argue these Jamaican women's mimicry may be read as an appropriation of an American popular cultural form as resistance against British colonial hegemony and suggest how further study of similar stories will open up new avenues for thinking about what constitutes resistant spectatorship.

5. **Subscribe** again. The feed now appears in the list when you click the star icon.

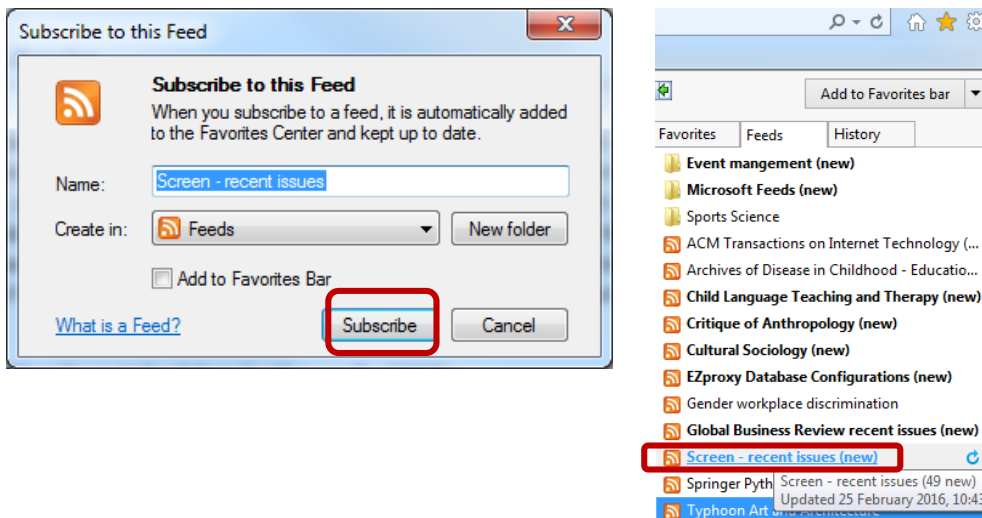
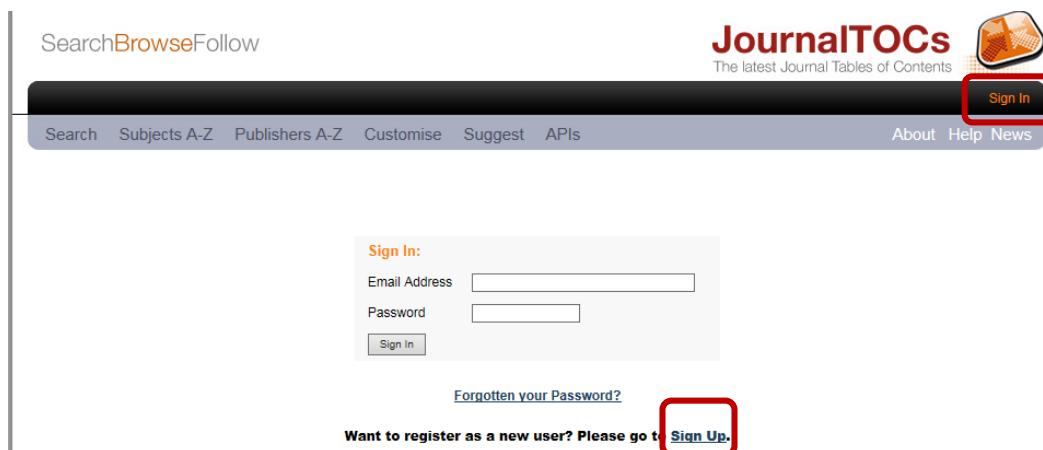


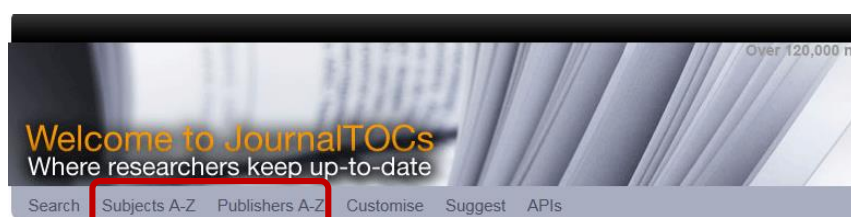
Table of Contents services

JournalTOCs is the largest, free collection of scholarly journal Tables of Contents (TOCs). It alerts you when new issues of your followed journals are published. You can also set up search alerts.

1. Go to <http://www.journaltoCs.ac.uk/>
2. Click **Sign In**, then on the next page **Sign Up**. A validation link will be sent to your email account. Then again **Sign In**.



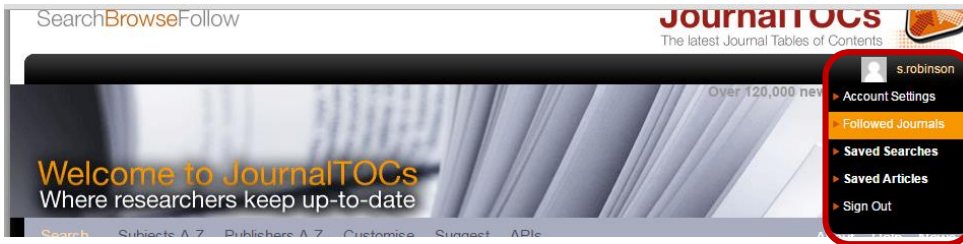
3. Choose journal(s) by publisher or by subject.



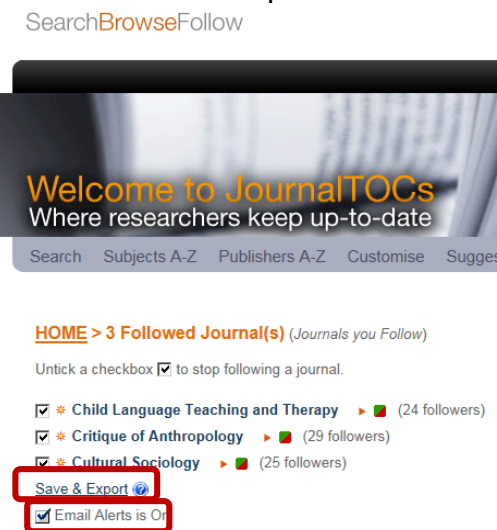
4. Select titles

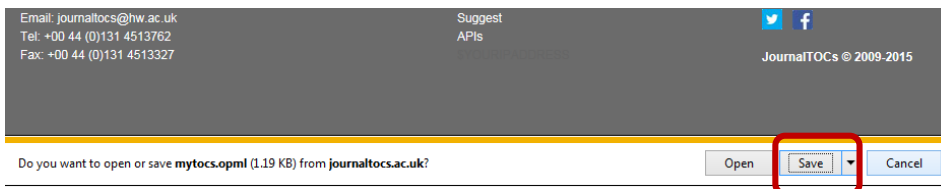
5. Click on **Followed Journals**.



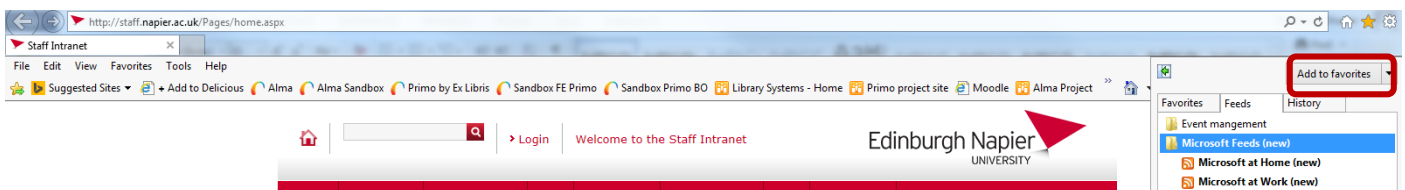
6. To receive up to 30 TOC alerts by email, tick the **Email Alerts** box.



7. To set up RSS feeds, click **Save & Export**. Select **Save as** and name the file, e.g. Sage.



8. Select **Import and Export** from the **Add to favourites** dropdown list.



9. Select the following options in turn from the dialogue box: **Import from file** > **Feeds** > browse to where you've saved the file> Select and open > Select a **destination folder for the feeds** > **Import**. See also <http://www.journaltoocs.ac.uk/whatisOPML.html>
10. Your new feeds will now display in your RSS reader.

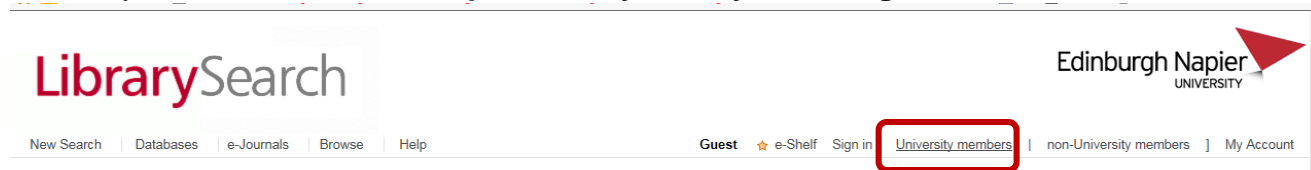

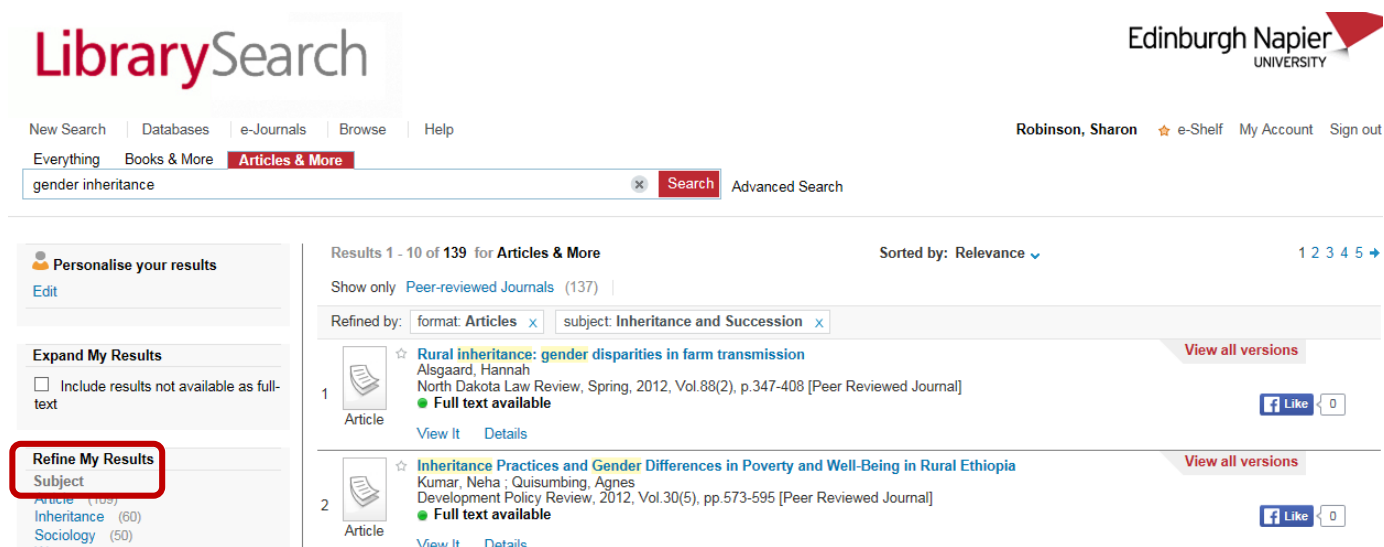

LibrarySearch Alerts

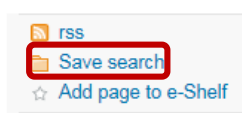
1. Log into LibrarySearch <http://librarysearch.napier.ac.uk> You will need to do this in order to save your search. **In the computer lab, you may see 2 login boxes.**



2. Perform a search > Refine your results if required, e.g. by format and subject



3. Scroll to the bottom left of the page to save your search



4. Clicking **Save search** will generate this box. Click Save and alert to open up the extra fields. Ensure that you select **Don't send**.

6. Then on **Searches** to see your alerts.

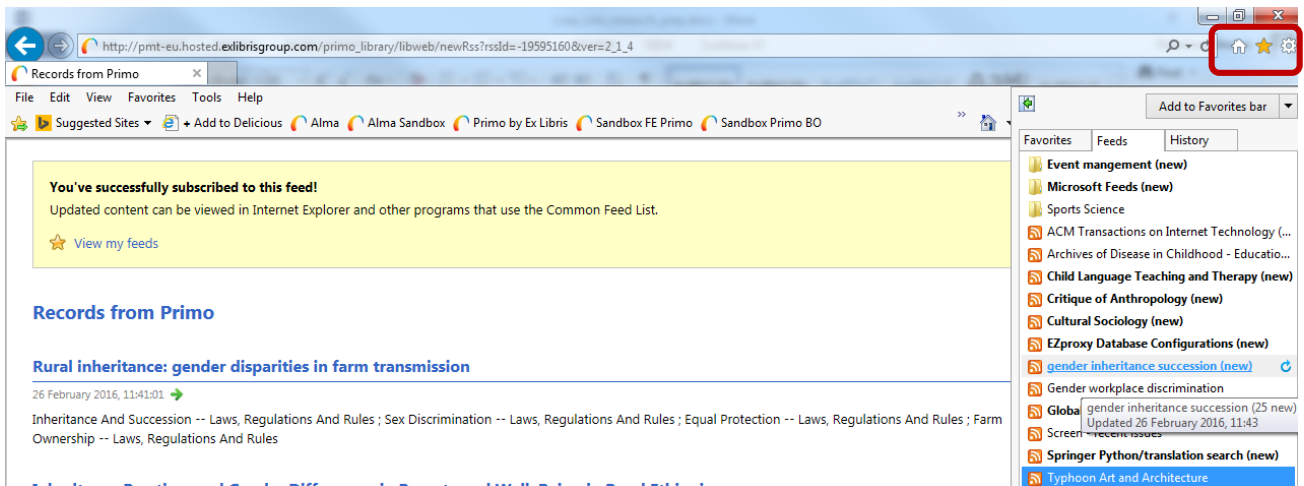
